### What is the FDIC?

**SUBJECT:** Microsoft Windows 11 Release

Windows 11, the newest version of the Microsoft operating system, was released today. Please be advised that Windows 11 is not yet supported by state security and support systems. No action is required by end users at this time. All agency information security officers (ISOs) have been notified that state agencies should not upgrade any systems to Windows 11 until all state support systems are ready, likely in early 2022.

Windows 10 will continue to be supported by Microsoft until October 14, 2025. Similar to the process all state agencies went through to upgrade systems from Windows 7 to Windows 10, state agencies will need to ensure all computers with Microsoft operating systems have a Windows 11 license before October 14, 2025.

As part of the upcoming budget build cycle for fiscal years 2024 and 2025, agencies should plan to purchase Windows 11 upgrade licenses. Though Microsoft expects to offer a free upgrade for all eligible licenses by mid-2022, most state licenses (e.g., licenses included with the purchase of a Dell computer and Windows 10 upgraded licenses) will **not** be eligible for the free upgrade to Windows 11. Other licenses (e.g., licenses purchased directly from Microsoft or via an enterprise licensing agreement) may be eligible for a free upgrade. To avoid unnecessary licensing upgrade costs, all new Dell computer purchases should include Windows 11 Professional licensing with downgrade rights for Windows 10. Downgrade rights allow users to run Windows 10 until systems are ready to upgrade to Windows 11. Agencies who have recently received quotes to purchase new Dell computers but not yet ordered them should review the quote prior to placing the order with the State Purchasing Division to ensure that the correct Windows license is included in the quote.

Re: **Senate Bill (SB) 78 Response from the Board of Examiners for Social Workers**

**History and Mission of the Board of Examiners for Social Workers**

In 1987, the legislature and Governor established the **Board of Examiners of Social Work** (Board) after declaring social work as a “learned profession, affecting public safety and welfare and charged with the public interest, and is therefore subject to protection and regulation by the State.” Since 1988, the Board has established the laws and regulations that govern the practice of social work in Nevada. These laws are framed within the Board’s mission to “**protect the public by setting standards of practice, qualifications, training and experience to those who represent themselves to the public as social workers and by promoting high standards of professional performance of those engaged in the practice of social work.**”

While we understand the concerns about antitrust findings for boards and commissions, we believe our Board members and office staff understand that our practice must be with a solid moral compass, integrity, and ethics. We, as a group, serve the public as a “public protection” entity, not a self-serving entity. In regulating the practice of social work in Nevada, we need subject matter experts, and frankly that means licensees, to serve on our Board. Once appointed, all Board members attend national training from the Association on Social Work Boards (ASWB) on the role of Boards in the regulation of social work practice nationally. Board members go through a thorough orientation to their role within our Board and they are often in contact with the Executive Director and Deputy Director as questions arise. When available, Board members can attend training offered by the State of Nevada.

We have translated our public protection mission into four overarching goals -

- licensing of qualified individuals;
- public protection through oversight of the practice by licensees which includes a disciplinary process for those that do not follow the law;
- Renewals and continuing competency of licensees; and
- Overseeing the law and regulations that pertain to the practice the Board oversees.

Since its creation, the Board has issued over 15,000 licenses. The Board currently licenses at four levels, Licensed Social Workers (LSW), Licensed Master Social Workers (LMSW), Licensed Clinical Social Workers (LCSW) and Licensed Independent Social Workers (LISW). There remain a small number of individuals with legacy licenses that were issued from 1988 to 1995. The Board currently has over 5000 licensees and 500 post-graduate interns.

On a daily basis, our office staff are expected to be subject matter experts related to social work practice in Nevada. This means we do the following –

- Communicate with licensees and constituents via phone, email or listserv posting;
- Respond to constituent inquiries regarding social work services;
- Provide informational resources on requirements for social work licensing in this state;
- Assist those with a license in another state navigate the endorsement process;
- Provide information regarding licensure scopes of practice for social workers;
- Provide consultation regarding social work practice and the ethical conduct of social workers;
- Review and approve applications for licensure and issue licenses to qualified social workers;
- Provide information regarding both Board and Legislative Continuing Education Unit (CEU) requirements and resources to obtain CEUs;
- Review and approve renewals and CEUs submitted for consideration;
- Review and approves post-graduate internship sites;
- Review, approve, and monitor social workers in post-graduate internships;
- Provide statewide training for post-graduate internship supervisors;
- Authorize licensed clinical social workers (LCSWs) to certify and decertify legal holds.
- Investigate accusations of wrongdoing and when appropriate engage in a disciplinary process. Work collaborative with the Deputy Attorney General (DAG) assigned to our Board;
- Collaborative with universities and provide workshops to assist graduating social workers with licensing and preparation for the national examinations they will be taking;
- Participate and collaborate with local, state and national organizations around social work practice in Nevada;
- Monitor NRS and NAC language as it relates to social work and hold public workshops and hearings on proposed changes to our laws and regulations;
- Prepare fiscal budgets and manage all pecuniary responsibilities;
- Submit annual fiscal audit to the Legislative Counsel Bureau (LCB);
- Provide data regarding licensing numbers as requested and required by law; and
- Maintain an interactive website which provides access to online applications, application status, renewals, primary source license verification, disciplinary actions verification, Board meeting information, current news from the Board, and links to resources.

### **Overall Comments on SB 78**

Dr. Sanchez and Ms. Haag were given a herculean task, without adequate resources to conduct the level of research necessary to produce a comprehensive analysis of the current state of the Title 54 occupational boards as well as the multitude of advisory boards and commissions. In reviewing “Reforming Nevada's Boards and Commissions: Findings and Recommendations” (Policy Paper), Business and Industry (B&I) proposes (pg. 32) that the 37, Title 54 occupational boards be reduced to

19 boards, that 20 of these boards be consolidated into 6 composite boards, and that 3 boards be eliminated. As it impacts the Board of Examiners for Social Work, the policy paper and SB 78 recommend that the Psychology Board, the Marriage and Family Therapy and Clinical Professional Counselors Board, the Social Work Board, the Alcohol, Drug and Gambling Counselors Board, and the Board of Applied Behavioral Analysis be consolidated into the Nevada Behavioral Alliance Wellness Board.

The question stands, **does a consolidated Behavioral Health Board offer the same levels of service and subject matter expertise as the 5 individual Boards currently offer?** These 5 boards oversee the practice of 6 discrete disciplines. We believe the answer is “no.” The proposed consolidation plan for the 5 behavioral health boards would take the five boards from 33 Board members to only 13 members. Of the 13, **only 9 would be licensees in their fields.** This is a negligent plan and would jeopardize all of our public protection mandates. The idea that one MFT, one CPC or one LADC could represent an entire field of practice suggests a profound lack of understanding about the various occupations and the intricacies of their scopes of practice, similarities and differences.

The Policy Paper, states (pg. 24) that “the requirements of licensure and certifications across many of Nevada’s occupations are inconsistent, ineffective and unequal.” It further notes that “each occupational and licensing board in the state operates under its own statutes and regulations, resulting in a fragmented and confusing process for consumers.” Of course, we have different statutes and regulations, in the case of the behavioral health boards, we oversee 6 different disciplines. Each Occupational Board has its own statutes to govern the practice of that discipline. Each Board must be the expert in its field, and we cannot pretend that consolidating board and making changes to their NRS and NACs will continue to protect the public adequately.

The planned consolidation and reduction of office staff would further serve to decrease the ability of the newly consolidated behavioral health board to provide all of the effective and efficient services as noted above. The amount of cross-training needed for each person to be able to easily navigate 6 different sets of licensing and renewal requirements, the scopes of practice of each license and the continuing education requirements for each, is in of itself daunting, and these are the clearer areas of knowledge that the merged office staff will deal with. Much of what the office staff must address is opaque and difficult to quantify. A combined behavioral health board will leave each discipline less able to effectively oversee the ever-changing landscape of licensure in the 6 respective fields of practice.

In reviewing the Policy Paper, five goals were identified. The assumptions that occupational boards, as a whole, are failing to do the things identified in the goals and recommendations, is insulting. Comments are made throughout the paper in generalities and vagueness. So, to be very specific, we will now discuss the **Board of Examiners for Social Workers** from the lenses of the goals identified in the Policy Paper

**Reform Goal #1 - “Increase board . . . accountability and transparency.”**

For our Board, it means the following –

- Holding Board meetings between nine and twelve times a year conducted under the guidance of public meeting law requirements.
- Posting Board agendas, meeting packets and meeting minutes on the website for the public, licensees and constituents to review both before and after the meetings.
- Post Board budgets and fiscal statements within scheduled Board meeting.
- Post the annual fiscal audit submitted to the Legislative Council Bureau annually, also available for review on the website.
- Anytime the Board submits changes to the Administrative Code (NAC), the Board goes through a rigorous process that invites scrutiny by our licensees, constituents and members of the Nevada Legislature.

The Policy Paper (pg. 20) suggests that “legislative oversight is another critical area of reform.” It suggests that the Sunset Committee and the “legislative process governing boards and commissions is often slow and cumbersome.” The Board of Examiners for Social Workers successfully completed a Sunset Subcommittee Review in 2018. We provide data as requested to the Joint Interim Standing Committee on Health and Human Services, the chairs of the Regional Behavioral Health Policy Boards, Commission on Behavioral Health, Legislative Commission, and the Interim Finance Committee. In June 2022, the Board successfully passed the U.S. Department of Justice background check audit conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI) It was noted that our agency “was to be commended for your attention and quality control” as related to our access to national criminal history record information. It is clear that our Board is very transparent and cooperative with any and all requests for information.

## **Goal #2 - “Enhance operations and reduce redundancy.”**

As a self-funded Board that receives no taxpayer money, nor any funds from the State, the Board must function with a high level of effectiveness and efficiency. Just like a small business, our Board has no one to fall back on if we are unable to pay our bills. Add to that, the fact that we must set aside money for an OPEB obligation, a PERS obligation, and we are expected to have at least 18 to 24 months of expenses set aside in cash reserves. We currently have two full-time staff and two part-time staff and have processed 755 applications in the first three quarters of FY2025 (with an average of 849 applications per year for the last 3 years). Our Board processed 2903 renewals in the first three quarters of FY2025 (with an average of 2832 renewals per year for the last 3 years).

To provide a context, the Board requested an increase in its “fee ceilings” in 2019. Our last “fee ceiling” legislation was approved in 1995, and it took 24 years to maximize the fees we were allowed to charge. Our last fee increase was in 2015. Until this legislation passed in 2019, allowing us to increase our fee ceiling and thereby our licensing fees, we were not “right side up” on our finances, we were not able to meet our expenses with our existing revenue and the Board knew it was in financial trouble. After the fee ceilings were approved, we made a 25% increase in our licensing and renewal fees. That was made effective on 12/30/2019. That small increase (between \$10.00 and \$37.50 annually) allowed us to not only move to fiscally functioning in the “black,” but over the last five years, we have been able to save enough money to fund our existing OPEB liability of \$201,082.00, our PERS liability of \$367,717.00 and we have saved six months of cash



reserves to date (\$288,000.00) and continue to work towards our goal of 18 months.

Additionally, this fee increase allowed us the fund a legislative mandate to provide online applications for licensure and renewals. Having a fully functional database has allowed us to reduce our full-time equivalent (FTE) from 4.20 FTE in FY2020 to 3.20 in FY2025. We will reduce the FTE again on 07/01/2025 to 2.70 for FY2026. This, while still providing the services listed earlier in this report.

### **Goal #3 - “Reduce administrative cost burdens to licensees.”**

This Board understands that cost savings and centralized administration are arguments for combining the Boards, and this could be a worthy focus if (B&I) works collaboratively with the occupational boards around areas where assistance would be welcomed. Since we pay for every service we have, including phone, internet, information technologies, legal services, accounting, postage, office space, record storage, copier services, etc., it is unlikely that B&I will automatically be able to provide these services at costs lower than we are currently paying. While it is the supposition that B&I can come in with lower costs, we have no data or fiscal information from them to support this. We would propose a menu of services that each Board could select to contract for. This would certainly reduce some costs and would allow B&I to gather data about the needs of the various Boards.

The potential disadvantages of combining the 5 behavioral health boards, in terms of professional autonomy, regulatory clarity, and public protection, outweigh any cost saving and benefits of centralized administration. Frankly, B&I does not know enough about what we do to provide a useful framework to consider consolidation.

The Policy Paper reviews four other states (pgs. 16 – 20) that have “mega-boards” or “composite boards,” none of the four states use for comparison are considered “frontier states.” The comparisons were never “apples to apples.” Additionally, the 2023 “State Occupational Licensing Index” compiled by the Archbridge Institute, identifies where each state ranks in terms of both a score regarding the process of licensing and a score regarding barriers to licensing. In this index, the lower the number, the poorer the ratings. Texas had the 2<sup>nd</sup> worst ranking, Utah the 15<sup>th</sup> worst ranking, Iowa, the 26<sup>th</sup> worst ranking and Florida, the 36<sup>th</sup> worst ranking. Interestingly, Nevada ranked in the 42<sup>nd</sup> position which put it above all the other states use for a comparison. While the Policy Paper may look good on paper, the practical realities are far different. Additionally, many stakeholders at both the state and national level argue that distinct boards better serve the public interest and ensure specialized and fair oversight of each profession.

Our Board is hoping to join the Social Work Licensure Compact. This would dramatically increase the social work workforce able to assist individuals living in Nevada. Should the legislation pass this session, it will reduce the cost of licensing for individuals who practice in more than one state. Instead of being licensed in every state, they will only need to license in their state of residency and can then practice in any and all compact stated. This will reduce the financial impact for licensees.

Additionally, our Board would like to evaluate, in the future, the possibility of reducing fees. Our goal is to have 18 months of reserves, while maintaining our OPEB, PERS and lease liabilities and once we achieve that, we will be able to consider reducing our fees.

**Goal #4 - “Provide excellent service delivery.”**

Our Board operates with a clear understanding that our licensees, constituents and other stakeholders are our customers, and they deserve excellent service. Our record speaks to our commitment to the public, state and our licensees. To that end, we work diligently to have a current and accurate website. Our online system for licensing and renewals has been a major step in improving our customer services. Licensees can renew their licenses and obtain a new wallet card immediately; applicants can track the status of their application easily.

We answer our phone with a live person who is a subject matter expert. The number of applicants that are truly shocked that we answer our phones is comical, they do not expect that level of service. This is especially true for applicants seeking to license by endorsement from another state. Many of these individuals come from a state with a “mega-board” or “composite board” and they tell us that they can’t reach a live person, that messages don’t get answered and that licensing is a long and arduous process. Our office staff can validate that experience as we often have the same problems when we contact social work boards in other states. We answer our phones. We also answer emails, usually within 24 hours and work collaboratively with all of our stakeholders. Again, we receive lots of positive feedback on our degree of responsiveness.

Combining the 5 behavioral health boards will reduce access to the subject matter experts and will make Nevada look like all those other states with composite boards. We have streamlined the process for licensing, especially for those endorsing a license into Nevada. We provide guidance on the order in which to complete their application process so that we can license them as quickly as possible. Our current barrier to efficiency is the amount of time it takes for the Department of Public Safety to process fingerprints and provide a background check.

As noted above, we have processed 755 applications in the first three quarters of FY2025 (with an average of 849 applications per year for the last 3 years). Our Board processed 2903 renewals in the first three quarters of FY2025 (with an average of 2832 renewals per year for the last 3 years).

**Goal #5 - “Enhance Nevada’s economic competitiveness.”**

We work collaboratively with our state universities to support the graduation and licensure of social workers; we have a place at the table on a national level with the Association of Social Work Boards. We continue to look for opportunities to support workforce development efforts for both social workers and mental health practitioners in our state. Joining the Social Work Licensure Compact will afford Nevada the opportunity to join the 23 other states already members. There are an additional 14 states with legislation in the 2025 legislative session.

**Board Meeting on March 19, 2025**

On March 19, 2025, at 9:00 a.m., the Board of Examiners for Social Workers held its monthly board meeting, and pursuant to the Open Meeting Law agendized a discussion of SB 78. This meeting was attended by the Board Chair, the four other members of the Board, the Board's Deputy Attorney General and the Board's Executive Director.

After a discussion of the intent, as detailed in the Policy Paper and in SB 78, to consolidate the 5 s under the Nevada Behavioral Wellness Alliance Board, a robust discussion was held regarding the 5 stated goals of such a consolidation. **The Board unanimously voted to oppose SB 78 and the consolidation of the Board of Examiners for Social Workers into the Nevada Behavioral Wellness Alliance Board.**

The Board would request that we be placed with the other Boards in Recommendation #5 of the Policy Paper which identifies twelve existing Boards as not being changed or eliminated yet subject to certain centralization and other recommendations referenced to in the Policy Paper.
